Gospel Meets Symphony TV Production to Air Nationally

Western Reserve Public Media's Gospel Meets Symphony: Let Freedom Ring! program picked up for national distribution

KENT, Ohio — Thursday, Jan. 21, 2010 — **Gospel Meets Symphony: Let Freedom Ring!**, a 2009 Western Reserve Public Media production, has been chosen for national distribution by American Public Television (APT) beginning this month. APT is the second-biggest distributor of programs for public television stations across the country.

Gospel Meets Symphony: Let Freedom Ring!, which premiered on Western Reserve PBS in April 2009, features the Akron Symphony Orchestra in concert with its 200-voice Gospel Choir celebrating Abraham Lincoln's 200th birthday. It will air again on Western Reserve PBS (45.1/49.1) on Tuesday, Feb. 2, at 9 p.m. and on Fusion (45.2/49.2) on Saturday, Feb. 6, at 9 p.m. A companion production, **Gospel Meets Symphony: Celebrating 16 Years!**, which documents the event's history, will air on Western Reserve PBS on Monday, Feb. 1, at 10:30 p.m. and repeat on Tuesday, Feb. 9, at 9:30 p.m.

"Akron is fortunate to have a great symphony and gospel choir and Western Reserve Public Media has a top-notch production team capable of creating award-winning, national-level programs. This is a perfect example of how bona fide collaborations can produce something greater than what each entity could do on its own."

In the production, Maestro Christopher Wilkins and guest conductor Roland Carter share the podium for performances including Jerry Smith's "When I Rose This Morning," Verdi's Nabucco Overture & "Va pensiero" and the spiritual "Ride On King Jesus." Special guest Charles J. Myricks Jr. conducts works from his musical "Paul: A Musical Journey."

"I think that what we are is an astonishing array of varieties of music," explains Wilkins. "The choral members get this wonderful sense that this music that they love can be exalted – can be brought to an epic scale – by the addition of the orchestra. It makes it so grand and so powerful." Gospel Meets Symphony was founded in 1994 and is one of the longest-running gospel-and-symphony events in the United States.

The Akron Symphony Orchestra began in 1949 when Mabel Lamborn Graham received \$500 as “seed money” from the publisher of the Akron Beacon Journal with the instruction to begin raising money for a professional, union orchestra. After three years of intense fundraising, spearheaded by Mrs. Graham and other dedicated volunteers, the Akron Symphony’s Classic Series was established in the organization’s first season (1952-1953) to provide concerts performed by professional musicians of the highest caliber. Guest conductors and soloists of regional and national stature have been an integral part of the Classic Series since its onset, and remain a high priority for the Symphony.

The Akron Symphony Orchestra is operated by the Greater Akron Musical Association (GAMA).
