The Jewish People: A Story of Survival

This documentary explores the vast 3,000-plus year history of the Jewish people, outlining key moments in history, as well as the obstacles that were overcome to survive to this day.

Forgiveness: A Time to Love and a Time to Hate*

Tuesday, April 26, and Wednesday, April 27, at 10 p.m.

Also airs Mondays, April 18 and 25, at 1 a.m.

This two-part film explores the concept of forgiveness, personal and political, through a series of individual stories. The chapters in the program address all aspects of forgiveness and confession from the personal level to the criminal, the public and the most heinous instances of genocide.

The Buddha

Wednesday, April 27, at 8 p.m.

Over 2,500 years ago, a new religion was born in northern India, generated from the ideas of a single man, the Buddha, a mysterious Indian sage who famously gained enlightenment while he sat under a fig tree.
