The program, which is in its third year, recognizes tech-savvy K-12 educators who are serving as leaders in the education technology space and incorporating digital media in classrooms.

The 2015 PBS LearningMedia Digital Innovators will receive yearlong professional development opportunities that include virtual trainings, access to premium and exclusive resources from PBS LearningMedia Custom service, invitations to special events, and access to a free PBS TeacherLine professional development course. PBS LearningMedia Digital Innovators will also receive ongoing support in their community from their local PBS member stations.

A resident of Girard, Ohio, Doran worked in broadcasting until 2008, when he decided to enter the field of career and technical education. He is an interactive multimedia teacher at Trumbull Career and Technical Center. "One program that our students are involved with is the 'PBS NewsHour' student reporting lab," Doran said. "Our center has outstanding resources that enable us to do projects like this, and I love it here."



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Coincidentally, as a high school student, Doran became interested in telecommunications as a career during a class visit to Western Reserve Public Media in Kent (then PBS 45 & 49). He is active in the Journalism Education Association and is a member of its curriculum initiative team.
