The team will be growing, and we are excited to have an even greater impact on children and families in Northeast Ohio.

The PBS Western Reserve team has been traveling across the region — meeting viewers at community events such as a Mahoning Valley Scrappers Game, the Kent Heritage Fest, Canal Fulton's Canal Fest and many more. Our team is working to build relationships with viewers, gather feedback from the community and introduce our programming and services to new people across the region. Broadening our audience helps the station remain strong and helps us meet our mission to serve as many people as possible in our community. The past year represents a significant milestone for the organization as we celebrated our 50th anniversary. We marked the occasion with a station open house in Kent, and we produced a documentary that chronicles our history, *PBS Western Reserve: A Study in Persistence*. It has been an honor to serve our community over the course of five decades, and I am certain that the organization will continue to grow, innovate and expand our impact in the years to come.

PBS Western Reserve will be embarking on a strategic planning process in the coming year. We are eager to involve the community in this process, as your insights and feedback are invaluable to shaping our future direction. The plan will identify opportunities for growth and innovation so that we can better serve everyone in our region with educational programming and resources, local stories and content, and national programming.





PBS Western Reserve

At PBS Western Reserve, we are dedicated to meeting our viewers wherever they are and offering content in the ways they prefer to consume it. We recognize the evolving landscape of media consumption, where audiences are increasingly shifting from traditional linear viewing to digital and on-demand platforms. Our commitment to accessibility ensures that our high-quality programming is available across a variety of channels, including traditional television, digital platforms, social media and more.

Operating under the nonprofit corporation Northeastern

Educational Television of Ohio Inc. (NETO), PBS Western Reserve comprises two separately licensed public television stations — WNEO and WEAO — and an **Educational Services division. Since** its establishment in 1971. WNEO. licensed to the city of Alliance, has served the Youngstown designated television market. WEAO, which began broadcasting in 1975, is licensed to the city of Akron and serves the Cleveland-Akron-Canton designated television market. Our programming is simulcast across both stations, ensuring a consistent and unified viewer experience.

With a signal that potentially reaches 3.3 million adults and more than 1.81 million households, we strive to provide content that educates, illuminates and inspires. Our active presence on social media platforms, including YouTube, Facebook, Instagram, LinkedIn and X, allows us to engage with our audience in real time, broadening our reach and fostering a vibrant online community.

We are proud of our legacy and our ability to adapt to changing viewer habits, and we remain committed to delivering content that resonates with the diverse interests and needs of our Northeast Ohio and Western Pennsylvania audience and beyond.



PBS Western Reserve







PBS Western Reserve (WNEO 45.1 / WEAO 49.1) airs 26,280 hours a year of commercial-free television on three broadcast services. It is our primary high definition broadcast service, offering a wide range of programs on subjects including science and nature; drama, art and music; how-tos, travel and adventure; history and biography; and news and public affairs. Additionally, the station airs 43 hours of children's programming each week. We enjoy an excellent relationship with regional independent producers and serve as the premier television outlet for their work.

Our organization also has two standard definition channels: Fusion (WNEO 45.2 / WEAO 49.2) and FNX (WNEO 45.3 / WEAO 49.3). Fusion offers a combination of arts and culture, public affairs, regional productions and BBC Worldwide programming. FNX features Native content from tribes across the United States and also includes programming that directly connects with a vast minority and immigrant population.

LUMINUS. STORIES ABOUT US

As a PBS member station, PBS Western Reserve is proud to air beloved national programs and a robust PBS KIDS catalog, but at the heart of our mission is a dedication to local storytelling. This fiscal year, PBS Western Reserve brought six new LuminUS: Stories About Us® productions to our audience alongside new seasons of our long-running series *Around Akron with Blue Green, Studio C Sessions* and *Forum 360*. Collectively, these programs showcase the rich culture, history and talent of the Northeast Ohio and Western Pennsylvania region.



Ringling, Akron and the 'Blue Heaven' Circuit

Written and produced by local independent producer and veteran journalist Fred Endres, this documentary tells the story of Akron's role in the relaunch of Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey circus following a deadly fire in 1944.

City Centric

This six-episode weekly series is the flagship series for the LuminUS collection. Each episode explores a city in our region through interviews with six changemakers who exemplify their city's values, culture and future.






Marauder Men: In Their Own Words

This three-episode series showcases a restored B-26 Marauder, located at MAPS Air Museum in Canton, and includes footage from taped oral histories compiled by WWII B-26 pilots in the 1990s. The series' first episode, "Forgotten Bomber of World War Two," is PBS Western Reserve's most-streamed video on YouTube with over 178,000 views.

The World According to Polka

Exploring the lively history and culture surrounding polka, this fun, award-winning series led by The Chardon Polka Band debuted to huge popularity among viewers, who called it a "well-done, entertaining, music-filled show" and "the best thing I have seen on PBS in a long time."


A Higher Law: The Oberlin-Wellington Rescue of 1858

Chronicling a key event in the history of abolitionism, this documentary examines the legacy and impact of the rescue of John Price, a Black man who fled enslavement, and the 37 Ohio men who came to his defense.



PBS Western Reserve: A Study in Persistence

This documentary traces the groundbreaking history of public television through the lens of PBS Western Reserve. Through insightful interviews, archival photos and cinematic reenactments, this production details how public television has persevered for over 50 years.



Around Akron with Blue Green

Akron producer Blue Green's monthly series has been shining a spotlight on all the good things Akron has to offer since 2016. Highlights from the past year include interviews with dozens of small business owners, Akron Mayor Shammas Malik and the CEO of Swensons on the Akron staple's 90th anniversary.

Studio C Sessions

A partnership with The Summit FM, this series of live music performances capturing artists from Northeast Ohio and beyond is in its ninth year on PBS Western Reserve.

This public affairs series, hosted by community members, provides a local viewpoint on global topics through thoughtful conversations with community leaders, experts and professionals.


PBS Western Reserve AWARDS & RECOGNITION



PBS Western Reserve received five regional Emmy® nominations and won two at the 55th annual Great Lakes Emmy Awards gala. For the independent production *The Master Craftsman*, filmmaker and director Phillip Sieb and director of photography Philip Leiter won in the Lifestyle category. Jacob Kouwe received the award in the category Talent: Performer, Host, Narrator for *The World According to Polka*.

At the 56th Public Media Awards, the National Educational Telecommunications Association (NETA) recognized PBS Western Reserve by awarding *The World According to Polka* in the category Content — Performing Arts — Division 2. *The World According to Polka* was also accepted for national distribution by NETA, which will make the local series' fun-loving musical exploration of polka available nationally to 294 of the association's member stations.

DIGITAL MEDIA



As the media landscape continues to evolve, PBS Western Reserve is devoted to meeting viewers where they are and ensuring our region has access to quality programming that teaches, illuminates and inspires. In the past year, the organization added 1,900 new PBS Western Reserve Passport accounts; welcomed 2,000 new YouTube subscribers; published 26 blogs; and released a *City Centric* companion podcast series. We also relaunched *Local Focus*, a short-form web series that provides local coverage of the people, places, culture and events that shape our region.

The expansion of the PBS Western Reserve digital media brand is an organization-wide priority that aims to meet the needs of our viewers by providing dynamic media that is accessible beyond the realm of linear television.

PBS Western Reserve introduced three paid internships in fiscal year 2024 — two in the Production Department and one in Educational Services. They offered valuable professional experience and skills training. **INTERNSHIPS**

PBS Western Reserve EDUCATIONAL SERVICES

Since 1973, PBS Western Reserve's Department of Educational Services has been part of the statewide network of educational technology agencies providing training to educators throughout the state.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Ten professional development courses offered by Christine Danhoff, a technology integration specialist contracted by PBS Western Reserve, were designed to foster continuous learning and innovation in teaching practices. The courses for K-12 educators focused on instructional strategies and technology integration in the classroom and included an AI webinar series.



OHIO Learns 360

Ohio Learns 360, a statewide initiative in collaboration with the Ohio Department of Education and Workforce and other Ohio PBS stations, offered resources to support educators and families of children in grades K-5 during non-school hours. Developed in response to learning disruptions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, the two-year initiative provided Camp in a Box STEM kits, family webinars and virtual field trips.

This educational series promotes good writing and is designed for children in grades K-3. Throughout the lessons, students join "Team Write" as their coach emphasizes the importance of writing while demonstrating how fun it can be.

Everyday Writing with

In this six-part collection, each lesson introduces students to the basics of a different writing concept using the concept of a basketball team. Each four- to five-minute video is accompanied by a handout for students to complete after viewing the video.

This series is beneficial in the classroom for use as an introduction to writing or as a supplemental resource to an already established curriculum. The lessons are stand-alone and can be instructed in any order.

In addition, there are four videos for caregivers to support young writers at home. Resources are available in the Education section of the PBS Western Reserve website.

In the fall, PBS Western Reserve brought Everyday Writing with Coach Write to the Public Library of Youngstown and Mahoning County for four outreach events focusing on writing activities for children in grades K-3.



Beighter States and the second second

Be My Neighbor Day, held in Akron in May and Youngstown in September, is inspired by *Daniel Tiger's Neighborhood*, a beloved PBS KIDS series. The focus of these events, aimed at children ages 0-5 and their families, is to promote family engagement in communities while supporting diversity, equity and inclusion. Be My Neighbor Day is organized in partnership with Fred Rogers Productions and PNC Bank.

During Be My Neighbor Days, community agencies that serve young children and families join us to raise awareness about local resources. Children have the opportunity to meet Daniel Tiger and receive a bag containing a book about community helpers and PBS KIDS literacy resources. PBS Western Reserve hosts a "Thank Our Essential Neighbors" coloring station where children can color thankyou pages for essential workers.















Tuesday's for Toddlers!

Tuesday's for Toddlers is a monthly program held in partnership with the Eastwood Mall in Niles and is designed for children and their caregivers. Each 45-minute session connects a PBS KIDS show to a themed topic, featuring engaging presentations by PBS Western Reserve. Topics cover literacy, computational thinking and science, complemented by handson activities or games to reinforce learning. These sessions encourage healthy social interaction among the toddlers and include read-alouds and movement songs provided by the Warren-Trumbull County Public Library. Participants receive theme-related books and take-home activities to support continued learning at home. Attendance typically averages 45 children along with their caregivers.

One attendee told PBS Western Reserve, "Both my kids had a great time and the fact that they give out books is fantastic because reading is so important!"

Science and nature programs such as *Nova* and *Nature* also enjoy broad appreciation, along with valued documentaries and historical series including *Independent Lens* and *American Masters*. News and public affairs programs, including *PBS News Hour*, remain essential to our viewers. While niche genres like arts and crafts and self-enrichment have smaller but dedicated audiences, overall interest spans a wide range of programming, reflecting our community's rich and varied tastes.

PBS Western Reserve continues to fulfill our mission to educate, illuminate and inspire by offering a variety of experiential events that bring our community together in meaningful ways.



These events demonstrate our commitment to bringing meaningful and immersive experiences to our members. In February 2024, we hosted the engaging virtual event Wine Tasting with Rick Steves, featuring a curated selection of French varietals.
